This type of feminism focuses on the liberation of women through individual change, the recognition and creation of a "women-centered" culture, and the redefinition of femininity and masculinity. Cultural feminism utilizes essentialist understandings of male and female differences as the foundation of women's subordination in society." (2)





Cultural feminism can be grasped with its four core keys; essentialism, separatism, women parallel to Nature, and weakness as strength. (3)
Hameeda Shaheen's poetic work reflects a profound engagement with Cultural Feminism, evident in these four distinct aspects:

Essentialism: Embracing Feminine Identity

Shaheen's poetry celebrates the essence of feminine experience, emphasizing the unique qualities and perspectives that define women's lives. Her work challenges patriarchal norms by affirming the value and validity of feminine identity. She believes in the mystique relationship of man and woman.

In the context of feminism, essentialism refers to the idea that there is a universal female experience and nature that transcends cultural and historical boundaries. This perspective posits that women possess inherent qualities, such as nurturing, empathy, and intuition, that distinguish them from men. Cultural feminism emphasizes the value of traditional feminine traits and experiences, seeking to redefine and reclaim them as positive and empowering. This approach celebrates women's unique perspectives, emotions, and ways of knowing. let's analyze Hameeda's one couplet, breaking it down deep to understand the point:

"There's a magician in the city of eyes, weaving stars into the fabric of my dress."

1. Magician (جادوگر):

Symbolizes the mystical, intuitive, and creative aspects of femininity, often associated with essentialist notions of women's nature.

2. City of eves (آتکھوں کی بستی):

Represents the realm of emotions, intuition, and inner knowing, which are traditionally feminized domains.

3. Weaving stars (تارے ٹائک رہاہے):

Suggests the creation of something beautiful, celestial, and divine, echoing the feminine ideal of nurturing and craftsmanship.

4. Fabric of my dress (میری چزی ش):

This signifies the integration of the mystical and creative energies into the speaker's being, emphasizing the embodied experience of womanhood.

This verse by Hameeda and many others like this embody essentialist and cultural feminist themes by celebrating the mystical and intuitive aspects of femininity, valuing traditional feminine domains (emotions, intuition), emphasizing women's creative and nurturing capacities, and affirming the importance of embodied experience in shaping women's identity.

Separatism:

(Some on one shore, others on another) - Represents the separate spheres of masculine and feminine experiences, emphasizing the need for women's autonomous spaces.

4. Resistance and compliance:

(Some joined, others were defeated) - Illustrates the complex dynamics of resistance and compliance, highlighting women's agency in challenging patriarchal structures.

5. Conflicted loyalties:

(Some were enemies of life, others dear to life) - Reflects the internal conflicts women face in navigating patriarchal expectations and their own desires.
